## February is Black History Month!


Black History Month was created to focus attention on the contributions of African Americans to the United States. It honors all Black people from all periods of U.S. history, from the enslaved people first brought over from Africa in the early 17th century to African Americans living in the United States today.

## In the Spotlight: Viola Davis

Viola Davis is an American actress. Known primarily as a stage actress, Davis won a Tony Award for Best Performance by a Featured Actress in a Play and a Drama Desk Award for her role in King Hedley II (2001). She won a Tony Award for Best Performance by a Leading Actress in a Play for her role in Fences. She also won her first Oscar for Best Supporting Actress in 2017 in *Fences* for which she also won a Golden Globe. Her performance in Doubt (2008) was nominated for several awards, including an Academy Award for Best Supporting Actress and a Golden Globe Award for Best Supporting Actress in a Motion Picture. In 2015, Davis made history by becoming the first Black woman to win an Emmy for Outstanding Lead Actress in a Drama Series, for her work in



ABC's *How to Get Away with Murder*. She has had the most Oscar nominations for an African American actress. Most recently, Viola produced and starred in her own movie, *The Woman King*, which sold \$94,333,330 in worldwide box offices.



## When to Stay Home from School:

FEVER A temperature of 100.4° or higher COUGHING THAT WON'T STOP

Or other problems with breathing OR VOMITING Within the past

24 hours

RASH Body rash with itching and/or fever HEAD LICE Itchy head, active head lice

INFECTION Eye is red and oozing a yellow or green discharge

## When to Return to School:

Fever free for 24 hours without the use of fever reducing medication such as ibuprofen or acetaminophen Cough is mild and infrequent and evaluated by doctor if needed Free from diarrhea and/or vomiting for at least 24 hours and evaluated by doctor if needed Free from rash, itching or fever and evaluated by doctor if needed

After first head lice treatment 24 hours after starting antibiotic eye drops or ointment

## WHEN TO KEEP YOUR CHILD HOME FROM SCHOOL

When your child is sick, they should stay home and not attend school. This not only benefits your child but other children and staff in the classroom at school.

#### WHAT ARE IMPORTANT SIGNS OF ILLNESS?

Some important signs of illness are:

- Temperature of more than 100° F orally
- Nausea or vomiting
- Stomachache
- Diarrhea
- Pale or flushed face
- Headache
- Persistent cough

- Earache
- Thick yellowish discharge from nose
- 10. Sore throat
- 11. Rash or infection of the skin
- 12. Red or pink eyes
- 13. Loss of energy or decrease in activity

#### WHAT SHOULD I DO IF MY CHILD HAS ANY OF THESE SIGNS?

If your child has any of these symptoms when it is time for school, it is best that they stay home. Most childhood illnesses are over soon and no cause for worry. But, if the symptoms are severe or persist for more than 24 hours, you should contact your private source of medical care.

Children sometimes use illness as an excuse to miss school. On the other hand, some children force themselves to go to school even though they are sick. There may be times that your child does not show signs of the above-noted symptoms but may be ill. It is up to you to be alert to your children's health and to decide when it is best to send them to school.

#### WHEN MAY MY CHILD RETURN TO SCHOOL AFTER AN ILLNESS?

The Centers for Disease Control recommends that individuals stay home "until at least 24 hours after they no longer have a fever (100 degrees Fahrenheit or 37.8 degrees Celsius) or signs of a fever (chills, feeling very warm, flushed appearance, or sweating) without the use of fever-reducing medicine." <a href="http://www.cdc.gov/flu/school/guidance.htm">http://www.cdc.gov/flu/school/guidance.htm</a>

Generally, your child may return to school when there is no longer a sign of illness. However, there may be times when it is necessary for your child to see your source of medical care before returning to school. Please call your school nurse if you have any questions regarding a specific condition.

#### WHAT WILL HAPPEN IF MY CHILD BECOMES ILL AT SCHOOL?

If your child complains of being sick or does not look well after they reach school, we will contact you. Therefore, it is important that you provide the school with up-to-date information and phone numbers to call in case it is necessary to contact you.
